The enormity of breast cancer for patients goes well beyond the initial diagnosis, affecting people at different times, in different ways.


The London Clinic Breast Centre offers patients the full spectrum of clinical and support services from advanced imaging to the latest biopsy techniques and treatments.





Sex education for cancer patients



When diagnosed with cancer, relationships with your spouse or partner can inevitably take a back seat. You suddenly become focused on one common goal seeking the best advice and treatment and conserving your mental and physical energy to help you tackle your condition.

It's all consuming and when treatment is over - whether surgery or a gruelling drugs regimen - many patients need to take time to rest and recuperate. Resuming a sexual relationship or maintaining some form of sexual intimacy throughout is probably the furthest thing from their mind.

And for many, particularly men, treatment for certain types of cancer (such as prostate or bowel) may leave them suffering from erectile dysfunction (ED) or impotence (the inability to develop or maintain an erection sufficient for satisfactory sexual activity). This can be embarrassing and a difficult condition to accept - leading to further anxiety at an already difficult time.

Lorraine Grover, a therapist in sexual wellbeing, runs weekly

sessions at The London Clinic and an important part of her role is to help advise and support patients who are experiencing ED following their treatment for cancer.

Lorraine tells Healthcheck: "Erectile dysfunction remains one of the great taboos and it is sad - and unnecessary - that so many men simply suffer in silence rather than asking for help. With the recent development of new drugs and specialist treatment. this problem can be managed successfully and there is no reason why many men that I see shouldn't be able to overcome this common problem."

Around 1 in 10 men suffer from ED and there may be a number of different causes*. There can be several factors that cause this 'mechanism' to fail, but Lorraine understands that when treating men pre or post-surgery or postchemotherapy there are several ways of addressing the problem, that may include drug therapy or medically designed aids including implants and vacuum devices.

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Lorraine adds: "What can often seem to be yet another setback, especially for those who have endured months of cancer treatment, can be resolved relatively quickly. Patients and/ or their partners just need to have the courage to self-refer or alternatively seek advice from their GP or consultant, who should be able to put them in touch with a qualified sex therapist".

"And, despite the range of effective treatments that are now available to cancer patients, they shouldn't under-estimate the

benefits of talking. Many patients and their partners feel nervous about starting to have sex after treatment which can exacerbate the physical issues further, so I'm here to ensure that couples keep communicating and don't become overwhelmed by the

prospect of a sex life after cancer."

Bowel cancer: tackling the taboo

As a nation, we are not renowned for recognising and addressing "embarrassing" health complaints – particularly those regarding our bottoms and 'toilet habits'.

However, in some cases, a reluctance to seek advice about changes to our bowel movements (such as prolonged constipation or frequent, loose stools, abdominal pain, extreme fatigue or bleeding from the bottom) can mean the difference between life and death. The message is clear – early diagnosis saves lives and if caught, bowel cancer (which is now the most common form of the disease with 35,000 new cases every year) can be successfully treated. In fact, over half of those diagnosed will be cured, sometimes without the need for surgery.

Chris McAndrew, Colorectal Nurse Practitioner at The London Clinic, tells Healthcheck: "Anyone with a family history of bowel cancer should be regularly monitored by a colorectal specialist or geneticist. But, because we know that early detection saves lives, we would recommend that anyone over the age of 50 is aware of and offered appropriate bowel cancer screening".

The NHS Bowel Cancer Screening Programme was launched in 2006 and so far is only open to people aged 60 - 69. By comparison, in the USA, bowel cancer screening by colonoscopy has been established since 2000 with the recommendation that average-risk individuals are screened every 10 years from age 50. Incidence rates

recommendation that average-risk individuals are screened every 10 years from age 50. Incidence rates of bowel cancer in certain patient groups are now falling in the USA suggesting that screening is having an overall positive impact.

There are a number of screening options available at The London Clinic, from the simple, non invasive Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBt), to colonoscopy examinations and new, specialised CT (X-ray) technology.

As part of our ongoing commitment to raising awareness of this disease and highlighting the importance of screening, The London Clinic will be joining forces with leading charity, Beating Bowel
Cancer – an organisation dedicated to promoting early
diagnosis and encouraging open access to treatment
choice for those affected by bowel cancer. We will be
supporting its annual awareness campaign, BE LOUID in
January 2010, in addition to other educational projects
(see: beatingbowelcancer.org for more details and
information about the disease: signs, symptoms
and treatment).

Chris adds: "The colorectal service at The London Clinic offers a comprehensive range of investigations and diagnostic procedures in an area led by gastroenterologists, endoscopists and colorectal surgeons. They are in turn hey are in turn supported by multi-displinary

and nursing teams experienced in the care and management of patients, ensuring they are supported every step of the way".

A dedicated patient telephone helpline, manned by a specialist endoscopy nurse has now been launched at The London Clinic and will remain an important part of the bowel cancer screening service at the new Cancer Centre.

Lift off!

THE CONSTRUCTION WORK AT THE LONDON CLINIC'S NEW CANCER CENTRE has just reached new heights as cutting edge medical equipment was lifted into place at the start of September.

More than 38 tonnes of sophisticated cancer technology was transferred into the new eight-storey centre (developed by Shepherd Construction) via a huge hoist.

In the lift (pictured) was radiosurgical equipment including: the CyberKnife® Robotic Radiosurgery System and Trilogy® System with RapidArc™. The London Clinic has spent approximately £6 million on new major items of radiosurgery, radiotherapy and imaging equipment – and is the first independent hospital in the UK to invest in both of these most up to date, new technologies for cancer patients.



The CyberKnife® Robotic Radiosurgery System destroys turnours with high-dose beams of radiation and is able to treat any part of the body with pinpoint precision. Trilogy® System with RapidArc™ delivers radiation directly into turnours (lessening the risk of attacking the surrounding healthy tissue) at a greater speed than other conventional radiotherapy treatments.

Paul Wood, Strategy Director at The London Clinic says: "It was a really momentous day, watching this highly sophisticated equipment being carefully delivered to its new home! Its arrival marks an important milestone in the Cancer Centre project, a symbolic occasion that signals the transformation of our building from mere 'bricks and mortar' towards a state of the art working hospital and centre of excellence." Our purpose built Cancer Centre is due for completion in December 2009.
